## ENSURING YOUR BRAND CHOICE IS DISPENSED AS WRITTEN

To help make sure your patients receive Remodulin® (treprostinil) Injection, use the National Association of Boards of Pharmacy reference guide below to check your state's language requirements for prescribing branded medication. The rules for writing "Dispense as Written" (DAW) can vary, so remember to include all necessary language for your state to preserve your choice of brand-name Remodulin.¹
